# **HAPPY NEW YEAR TO ALL!** President's Note

BRRRR! It is cold outside! Looks like we may not be doing much fishing this winter. It is a perfect time to work on the fly box for the upcoming season. Seneca Valley Trout Unlimited (SVTU), your Chapter, would like to help you work on that fly box.

It starts with our first meeting on January 23 when Steve Moulton will present "Caddisflies 101 for the Fly Fisher." If your box is like mine, it has a bunch of random Caddis. I hope to have a much better idea of when to use which Caddis pattern after Dr. Moulton's presentation. Brave the cold and come out to learn about this important aquatic species.

Improving your fly box continues with the second Charles August Memorial Fly Tying Series offered by SVTU again this year. We will be tying flies at the IWLA-Rockville Chapter House from 7:30-9:30 p.m. on February 6 and 20, March 6 and 20, and April 3 and 17. On February 6 we will start with Stoneflies and follow with sessions devoted to midges, nymphs, emergers, caddis, and terrestrials. We will close the fly tying sessions with a session on the IWLA Lake in early May.

Our March 27 meeting will feature Greg Cwalina with a demonstration on trying poppers. The attendees at this meeting will get a chance to use the information and tie their own poppers at the meeting. This will be a fun hands-on meeting with a chance to tie poppers of your own design.

As you can tell SVTU is an active chapter with our meetings and events, including Fly Fishing 101 in the spring (scheduled for April 28, 2018) and a get together in the fall. The Chapter's conservation activities on Beaver Creek continue with a workday in October and plans to assist the Beaver Creek Watershed Association and Maryland's Department of Natural Resources on improvements to the State-owned section of Beaver Creek. Our role is being defined but it will involve volunteers. This will be a chance to make a lasting difference in trout fishing in our region. Watch the website and e-mail notifications for dates and needs.

SVTU depends on volunteers to make all we do happen. Are you involved? I know most of you are not, because I know the group of dedicated volunteers that make things happen (my thanks to them) and that group is not large in number. We can use some help!

	Program: Caddisflies 101 for the Fly Fisher	
	by Steve Moulton, PhD.	

Steve Moulton will deliver a presentation tailored to fly fishers and conservationists featuring information about the diversity, biology, and ecology of caddisflies. He has conducted research on the biogeography, taxonomy, and ecology of caddisflies throughout North America, with special emphasis on the faunas in the Ozark/Ouachita mountains and southwestern United States.

Steve has been a valued friend of SVTU over the years, actively supporting many of our activities, including past meeting presentations and stream surveys.

Caddisflies are one of the most important insect groups known to flyfishers. There are approximately 1,700 species of caddisflies in North America with the World fauna variously estimated between 10 and 50 thousand species; over 300 species have been documented from MD and VA. Caddisflies play an extremely important role in aquatic ecosystems by processing organic material and serving as a food base for other animals. They occur predominantly in springs, streams, rivers, ponds and lakes throughout the world. However, a few species are terrestrial throughout their entire life cycle and one group inhabits marine waters. Despite occupying a wide range of aquatic habitats, caddisflies are generally intolerant of poor water quality and stressed environmental conditions. As such they are often used by water resource management agencies as indicators of the aquatic health.

Caddisflies undergo complete metamorphosis with four life stages (egg, larva, pupa, and adult). Excluding the egg stage, fly fishers pattern flies imitating each stage that range in size from approximately 2mm (No. 24 or 26 size hook) to over 40 mm (No. 4 or 6 size hook). The grand challenge of fly fishers is to "match the hatch" by presenting a fly that imitates the life stage fish are mostly likely to prey on. Caddisfly larvae are best known for their architectural behaviors using of silk to build retreats, feeding nets, and portable cases. Larvae are soft-bodied and usually cream-colored or greenish with a darker-colored head and thorax (segment of body possessing the legs). Depending on geography, habitat, and temperature, caddisfly adults can emerge yearround. Some species (e.g., grannoms or Mother's Day Caddis) develop and emerge synchronously in large swarms for a one or two-week period usually in the spring or fall. Most other species develop and emerge at different rates such that adults are found almost yearround.

We encourage folks to not only reconnect each month and talk about fishing but bring photos, maps, etc. of their favorite streams / fishing experiences during the "social hour" of 7:30 to 8:00 p.m. in each meeting.

#### 2017—Recap of Meetings & Events

SVTU held meetings in September, October and November. In addition, we sponsored / participated in several events. These events are highlighted below.

#### Fourth Annual Fly Fishing 101

In April 2017 the Chapter held it's Fourth Annual Fly Fishing 101 event at the IWLA lake in Germantown. The weather was great and we had a great turnout.

The event started off with grilled hamburgers with all the fixings. This is an intensive half-day event we host for those who have an interest in "what is fly fishing" but don't know where to start. Some highlights of the afternoon:

- Two FFF-certified instructors to work with students with casting
- Chapter members demonstrated knots and rigging
- Steve Moulton sampled the stream and lake to see what bugs could be found and discussed the various macroinvertebrates with the students
- James Harris, owner of Beaver Creek fly shop came to our event to demonstrate stream techniques
- Greg Cwalina of Patuxtent River Flies demonstrated fishing from a kyak

#### Memorial Service for Charles S. August

Members of the Seneca Valley Chapter joined friends and family of Charles S. August on Wednesday, October 11 to commemorate his life at a memorial service. Members of SVTU Chapter and the Izaac Walton League of America's Rockville Chapter worked with the family to host the service. Originally slated to be held at the IWLA lake, inclement weather dictated that we move the service from the lake to the Chapter clubhouse on Waring Station Road.

Approximately 40 people (family, friends, colleagues, and fishing buddies) celebrated Charles' life, important accomplishments, and love of all things fly fishing. Many people spoke about Charles, his important contributions to the field of pediatric oncology, his love of family, his love of life, his wonderful sense of humor, and especially his passion for fly fishing.

Charles was deeply involved in the SVTU Chapter. He was a member of the Chapter's leadership and the longtime Secretary. Charles participated in most of the Chapter's events and projects, which included cleaning up streams, planting trees and shrubs, working to ensure success with many Chapter events including Fly Fishing 101, BBQs, fund raisers, the IWLA Hunting & Fishing Day, and many more. He initiated the annual fly tying classes which are held at the IWLA Chapter house on certain Tuesday evenings from January until April. They are now named the Charles S. August Fly Tying Classes and, as noted above, will begin in February. Charles is deeply missed and remembered fondly.

#### September 2017

Program: Conservation & Climate Change Presenter: David Cleaves, SVTU Chapter Secretary Retired from US Forest Service as the Climate Change Advisor to the Chief of the Service

Dave talked with us about the role of outdoor enthusiasts and citizen conservationists in dealing with the changing climate. He talked about how the changes in the climate are affecting outdoor recreation. He discussed how we can become more aware of these changes and build climatic changes into our education, conservation, and advocacy. He discussed how outdoor recreation groups are doing to address and adapt to the changing climate.

It was a beautiful, educational and fun day.

# Program: Maryland Biological Stream Survey Program

# Presenter: Dan Boward, Maryland DNR

Dan gave an really interesting summary of the Maryland Biological Stream Survey Program at our Chapter meeting. The Maryland Biological Stream Survey (MBSS) collects fish, benthic macroinvertebrates, other fauna, land use and water quality information from streams in Maryland to develop a Stream Health Index for both fish and benthics.

Since the program began in 1995, there has been a total of 5,833 sites surveyed through 2016. The surveys have found an increase in "good" stream conditions since 1995, with the percentage of stream rated "poor" about the same. There has been a decline in stream rate "fair" over the period. The MBSS is the sponsor of the Maryland Stream Waders Program, a volunteer based stream assessment effort to help educate and enhance stream stewardship.
