Will it ever stop raining? Rather than improving our casting we might all need to start our Ark construction class!

Seneca Valley TU (SVTU) cannot help you with the Ark construction (what is a cubit anyway?) but we can help with the fly casting. SVTU is hosting our second annual casing clinic on Sunday, October 21. We will start with casting instruction and with casting instructors working one-on-one with you to improve your casting ability. Then we break for lunch and an opportunity for you to help support your chapter with a silent auction. Finally, we return for more casting. What an opportunity! Top flight casing instruction for FREE and we feed you lunch too. The website will have a signup page by Oct 1, so sign up and show up! As many of you know SVTU has been involved with efforts to improve Beaver Creek in Washington County for more than a decade. While there is still more to do (stream restoration is a long-term process), our September meeting will focus on the current state of Beaver Creek. The Maryland Department of Natural Resources has purchased the core of the fly fishing only area to assure public access. That introduces both opportunities and challenges. We will discuss the potential role of SVTU with the new state ownership and the potential for conservation projects and funding needs. Come out to the September meeting (September 25 at the IWLA Rockville Chapter House) to be a part of this discussion that will help set the conservation agenda for the Chapter and the future of Beaver Creek. Our final meeting of the fall season on November 27 will feature James Harris of Beaver Creek Fly shop to talk about gearing up for the new fishing year. Are you as confused as I am about the seemingly never-ending claims of fly line suppliers? While we all recognize that the fly line is an important connection between the rod and terminal tackle, does it really help you catch more fish? How? And at a \$100 per line, why is that better than the \$20 line I now use? I personally am looking forward to James's presentation to help me make understand the gear maze.

On Sunday, October 21, SVTU will host a casting clinic, cookout and Fund-Raiser at the IWLA Rockville lake. SVTU has arranged to have six FFF-certified casting instructors available to work with the attendees. Instructors will work one-on-one with each attendee to diagnose and correct casting problems and improve the accuracy, distance and types of casts for different situations. We will start the event with a round of casting, break for burgers at noon, and then continue the casting instruction. The Chapter will also conduct a silent auction to raise funds for our next conservation or education effort. The event is free, and we even feed you lunch. A great deal! Come out and join us. SVTU held meetings in January, March, April and May. In addition, we sponsored / participated in several events. A summary of the events and are highlighted below.

Chapter Events of 2018

Charles August Memorial Fly Tying Series—February-May 2018

Seneca Valley TU hosted fly tying at the IWLA-Rockville Chapter house starting on February 6 and then every two weeks through March and April. We concluded the tying series with a May 1 session at the IWLA lake where we "water-tested" some of the flies we tied. For this series we tried something new and jumped right into tying flies that are commonly used without spending several weeks on basic techniques by working the techniques into the tying classes as

needed. In the first week we tied stoneflies, and then went on to midges, mayfly nymphs, emerger patterns, caddisflies (both emergers and elk hair caddis) and then terrestrials (ants and beetles). We had as many as a dozen students participate in the tying sessions working with several Chapter members. The SVTU Fly Tying series is named in honor of Dr. Charles August who started the Chapter's Fly-Tying instruction.

Fly Fishing 101, Saturday, April 28, 2018

What a marvelous day for an event. The weather was perfect! We had another great turnout for SVTU's Fifth Annual Fly Fishing 101. With about 25 students, the demand for basic fly-fishing instruction continues to be strong. We started with an excellent lunch of hot burgers off the grill and all the trimmings. Then students worked their way through the half-day course with entomology and flies, rigging and knots, stream and lake techniques, and casting instruction with certified FFF fly casting instructors.

It is an intensive half-day session that covers the basics across the range of subjects to successfully fish on your own. It will not make you and expert, but it will get you started. Look for our course next spring for you, your partner, or your kids or grandkids. Save Our Steams (SOS) June 30, 2018

June 30 was a warm and humid morning at the IWLA Rockville Chapter Lake. However, this added to the enthusiasm of a group of 4H members and Girl Scout Troop members to get into Seneca creek for "hands-on" water-quality sampling. The goal was to evaluate the water quality utilizing the SOS macroinvertebrate "method," which evaluates water quality based on the range of macroinvertebrate found in a stream. SVTU partners with the IWLA-Rockville chapter to help educate youth on water quality awareness and the importance of water for public health and recreational importance. Thirty people participated, and through the SOS metrics found Great Seneca creek at the IWLA lake to be in the fair to good range.







SVTU Chapter and TU National Visit the Stroud Water Research Center (SWRC)May 4, 2018 Submitted by Nate Wallace

On the morning of May 4th, 2018 eight of us met at the front entrance of the Stroud Water Research Center in Avondale, PA for a tour of the facility, a lunch with an interactive discussion with staff, and a tour of the adjacent White Creek, which they've been studying and researching since 1967.

Attendees:

From the Seneca Valley Chapter of Trout unlimited (SVTU) and the Rockville Chapter of the Isaac Walton League were Noel Gollehon, Jack Higgins, Jackie McGee, Tom Vegella, Eve Wallace, and Nate Wallace. Most of these SVTU members are also members of the Isaac Walton League of America Rockville Chapter. Keith Curley and Jake Lemon from Trout Unlimited National joined us.

One purpose of the visit was to introduce the senior staff of Trout Unlimited to the staff of the SWRC to initiate a discussion of how the two organizations can work together. Trout Unlimited is aware of the work of SWRC and has had some staff working together.

Short background on the SWRC

The SWRC researches freshwater systems using the river continuum concept, which it developed. This concept considers a river as a single interconnected system, one that begins as a tiny channel and grows larger as it moves downstream. As it joins with other streams and swells with groundwater, its channels widen and deepen until as a large river it flows into the ocean. The distinguishing characteristic of such a system is that it is continuously moving. Each part of a stream—each glide, riffle, and pool—is affected by what happens not only immediately around it, but also upstream and downstream. As it flows, a stream's physical characteristics change to keep it from overwhelming its channel, and its biological communities must adapt to those changes. The river is connected from its headwaters to its mouth. To best understand how a river system works, it should be viewed as a physical and biological continuum, striving to maintain its equilibrium in the face of constant change.

The SWRC has been studying the White Clay Creek and other domestic and international fresh water streams for more than 50 years and has contributed much of the seminal scientific research and methodologies used by researchers worldwide.

We were greeted by Dave Arscott at the main entrance

We were given an extensive tour of the main buildings of the SWRC by John Jackson. They included the original bank barn which now houses the boardroom and library. When the SWRC was formed, the bank barn was renovated, and an addition was built onto it. The addition housed the original groundbreaking indoor stream constructed by the first Director, Robin Vanote. There have been a number of buildings added to this original structure, including the replica of a Shaker meetinghouse, extensive laboratory facilities, offices, classrooms, and the Moorehouse Environmental Complex. The latter was designed as LEED Platinum certified green building and is connected to the earlier buildings by a greenhouse.

The luncheon discussion

We were served lunch in the Shaker meetinghouse room and were introduced to several of the staff, including Dave Arscott (President & Executive Director), John Jackson (Senior Research Scientist), Melinda Daniels (Associate Research Scientist), and Scott Ensign (Assistant Director & Research Scientist). Dave Arscott presented a slide deck of SWRC research, initiatives, locations, technologies, and how they work with local schools and organizations. Dave presented real-time on-line stream data sources and the open source technologies they use for instrumentation to measure relevant stream factors such as turbidity, PH, chemicals present, water flow, temperature, etc. This initiated an extensive discussion of open source hardware and software stream monitoring instrumentation. These data sources should be of great usefulness to TU National.

We learned that the SWRC is overcoming the obstacles to large near-real-time data collection networks by using Arduino, an open source electronics platform. We are sharing our experiences building wireless sensor networks in an online community, so that

anyone can replicate and implement their own versions of the SWRC instrumentation. To learn more, visit EnviroDIY.org

The outdoor tour of White Clay Creek

Dave Arscott and Melinda Daniels gave us a tour of the adjacent White Clay Creek where we participated in a wide-ranging discussion of instrumentation and of the watershed restoration efforts. This tour and discussion were more detailed than the one we had last year. They shared what had been successful, what had worked. and what they've learned. As many of us have been involved in stream restoration projects, we were particularly concerned that we learn their findings. SWRC first removed invasive species, planted the correct types of trees to shade the flood plain, and utilized natural barriers and materials to minimize scouring and erosion. SWRC also worked with farmers, whose lands drain into White Clay Creek, to promote good land-use and farming practices that minimize sediment [from runoff], nutrients [from fertilizers], and pesticides from entering streams. Thoughts on the visit to SWRC

The consensus was that this visit was more interesting than the previous visit in April 2017. The SWRC staff tailored their discussions to the interests of our group. The staff is interested in working more closely with organizations such as Trout Unlimited and the Isaac Walton League of America. We all were fascinated with the open source real-time stream monitoring instrumentation technology the SWRC is sharing, as well as their insights and knowledge of stream restoration that we can implement.

Chapter Meetings in 2018

January 2018

Program: Caddisflies 101 for the Fly Fisher Presenter: Steve Moulton, PhD

Dr. Steve Moulton has been a valued friend of SVTU over the years, actively supporting many of our activities, including past meeting presentations and stream surveys.

Steve gave an awesome presentation "Caddisflies 101 for the Fly Fisher" that was tailored to fly fishers and

conservationists featuring information about the diversity, biology, and ecology of caddisflies.

Caddisflies are one of the most important insect groups known to fly fishers. There are approximately 1,700 species of caddisflies in North America with the World fauna variously estimated between 10 and 50 thousand species; over 300 species have been documented from MD and VA. Caddisflies play an extremely important role in aquatic ecosystems by processing organic material and serving as a food base for other animals. Despite occupying a wide range of aquatic habitats, caddisflies are generally intolerant of poor water quality and stressed environmental conditions. As such they are often used by water resource management agencies as indicators of the aquatic health.

The grand challenge of fly fishers is to "match the hatch" by presenting a fly that imitates the life stage fish are mostly likely to prey on. Caddisfly larvae and adults are important year-round sources of trout food and of interest to fly fishers. The presentation was exceptionally informative, and we thank Steve for sharing his time and knowledge about caddisflies with us.

March 2018

Program: Tying Popper Flies
Presenter: Greg Cwalina of Patuxent River Flies

Greg Cwalina had a hands-on meeting presentation on "Tying Poppers". Greg brought his materials, and all had a great time tying top-water popper patterns for bass. The painting, epoxying, and adding the trailing feathers and skirt became an individualized art project, that you can use to fish with! It was a great time. And the since the meeting was during the fly-tying classes the group was in a "tying" mode.

May 2018

Program: Fishing on the Upper Chesapeake Bay Presenter: Bryan Donaway of Flys in Disguise

Bryan Donaway gave an outstanding presentation about fishing on the Upper Chesapeake Bay. He discussed places to look for fish, especially striped bass. He also talked about various types of gear and how to build a leader for fishing on the bay. Bryan has over 20 years of fly-fishing experience in fresh and saltwater. He is the owner and operator of Flys In Disguise, providing fly fishing instruction and guided trips on the Gunpowder and Savage river watersheds.

Spring 2018

Program: Trout in the Classroom

Several members of the Chapter supported the local schools that participated in raising trout from eggs with the second phase of TIC, release of the fingerlings into local waters. The program will restart in early 2019. Check our website for information.
