HAPPY NEW YEAR TO ALL! President's Note

Greetings Chapter members. The weather has been rather unusual so far in the new year with a few days being "spring-like". I hope some were able to get out on a stream or lake. With cold weather on the horizon again, it may be a perfect time to prepare for the upcoming season. Seneca Valley Trout Unlimited (SVTU), your Chapter, would like to help you in that effort!

2019 started with our first session of our **Charles August Fly Tying series** offered by SVTU. The first session was held on Tuesday, February 5th. The snow event of the previous Tuesday resulted in it being rescheduled. The change did not dampen the enthusiasm of our members since the session was attended by nine members who were taken though the basics of fly-tying including tools and their use, fly components, hooks, thread management and tying on materials by Chapter volunteers. The participants then put their efforts on to the vices to tie a very useful "simple" fly, the green weenie.

The sessions are scheduled and will continue at the IWLA-Rockville Chapter House from 7:00-9:00 p.m. on February 19, March 5 and 19, and April 2 and 16. We will close the fly-tying sessions with a late afternoon of fishing on the IWLA Lake on April 30th. (Since we missed a session due to weather, we will schedule a makeup session in April, based on participants availability.)

Our first 2019 Chapter meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 26th (a change from our "normal" schedule of starting the year off in January). In addition to being the first opportunity to again share an evening with fellow members, and learn something new from the program, this meeting is key since it is when we hold elections of Chapter Officers and Directors. We have several openings. Let us know if you are interested in volunteering and filling one of the open positions.

We are currently finalizing our March, and subsequent Chapter meeting programs. Be on the lookout for future emails, or if you have not yet subscribed to our "opt-in"/secure email system, check our website for updates. The links to both are included on page 5 of this newsletter.

As you can tell SVTU is an active chapter with our meetings and events, including Fly Fishing 101 in the spring (scheduled for May 4, 2019) and a get together in the fall. The Chapter's conservation activities on Beaver Creek continue with two planned (not yet scheduled) activities: the late Spring maintenance on the stream delayed due to the weather last fall, and benthic invertebrate sampling. Our role is being defined but it will involve volunteers. This will be a chance to make a lasting difference in trout fishing in our region. Watch the website and e-mail notifications for dates and needs.

SVTU depends on volunteers to make all we do happen. Our Chapter has approximately 350 members. Are you involved? I know most of you are not, because I know the group of dedicated volunteers that make things happen (my thanks to them) and that group is not large in number. We can use some help!

2018—Recap of Meetings & Events

SVTU held meetings in September, October and November. In addition, we sponsored / participated in several events. The summary of our activity is highlighted below.

Chapter Meetings & Programs:

September 2018 Chapter Meeting

Mr. Doug Hutzell, a member that lives in Hagerstown, gave a great presentation on Beaver Creek in Washington County. SVTU has been involved in conservation and restoration activities on Beaver Creek for more than a decade. In that period the stream has progressed from a put-and-take trout fishery to a self-sustaining wild brown trout fishery. The transformation of the stream has been amazing and SVTU has made a difference in the provision of quality fishing opportunities to fly-anglers in the region with our partners. Doug's presentation talked about those partners, progress to date and future plans as a core portion of the stream comes under the control of Maryland Department of Natural Resources.

November 2018 Chapter Meeting

James Harris, Owner of Beaver Creek Fly Shop, was the presenter the November/December meeting with a talk "All about Fly Lines." The new advanced fly lines are specialized and expensive by historical standards.

However, if you have an advanced technology graphite fly rod it needs to be matched with the right fly line for your fishing conditions to achieve top performance. The take away message is that the fly line is an important part of the fly fishing "system" and recent advances mean there is much to know. If you have a need for a fly fishing system "tune-up" a new fly line might be in your future. Take your fly rod up to the Beaver Creek Fly shop and try the different lines to see how they work on your fly rod. It can make a huge difference as we learned at the meeting.

Chapter Special Events

SVTU Hosts Second Casting Clinic: October 2018

On Sunday, October 21, SVTU hosted its second annual casting clinic, cookout and mini Fund-Raiser at the IWLA Rockville lake. We had 14 students of the casting art paired up with 4 certified instructors. It was a challenging day to cast because of the windy conditions, so it was a realistic fishing day. If you wanted to know how to cast in the wind this was the day to learn. It was a chilly, partly-cloudy day and the wind never stopped. The chapter wants to thank everyone who came out for the event, and we would like to thank all of the instructors for volunteering their time and expertise to make this a worthwhile day. We had a great lunch with good people and a fun little raffle that raised some chapter funds.

2018/2019 Conservation Programs

Support for Beaver Creek

When Doug Hutzell, a Chapter member who lives on Beaver Creek, and James Harris, proprietor of Beaver Creek Fly Shop, get together the ideas about Beaver Creek abound. One of their recent ideas was the need to inform anglers about wading in Beaver Creek during the winter while trout eggs are in the gravel. Beaver Creek has many, many redds this past fall, which implies a great year of reproduction if that spawning activity is not disturbed. Redds—the gravel nest where trout lay and fertilize eggs—are pretty easy to spot in November because of the clean gravel. However, let a few highwater events come through and deposit a layer of silt and the redds are hard to spot for even those that know where to look. Doug and James came to SVTU with a need and SVTU responded by designing a sign and getting DNR approval for installation. The sign was printed on aluminum with a plastic core and aluminum backing for stability. SVTU purchased the signs, bolts and

posts. On Saturday, January 12 Doug Hutzell working with Noel and Leslie Gollehon installed six of the signs at key locations on Beaver Creek. Additional signs will be installed by Doug Hutzell. The signs will be removed in the spring and then reinstalled in the fall.

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) Egg Distribution

In **December** several members of the Chapter supported the Trout in the Classroom (TIC) distribution of eggs to schools in the Chapter area. The next activity related to this is volunteer assistance to the schools for release of the hatched fingerlings into local streams in the Spring. We did not get out in the wet fall weather of 2018 to do maintenance on Beaver Creek, a stream in Washington County. Beaver Creek has been the focus of past SVTU restoration efforts, and it requires at least an annual maintenance effort. Tree tubes to protect planted trees need to be removed and beaver guards installed. Trees need to be pruned and a general trash pickup is needed. In addition, we will be removing the signs along Beaver Creek warning about wading in the stream.

Sixth Fly Fishing 101 Afternoon

SVTU will again partner with the Rockville Chapter of Isaak Walton League to offer our fourth third "Learn to Fly Fish" afternoon (or as we call it Fly Fishing 101) at the Rockville Chapter Lake. It will be a day of pure enjoyment for all.

This is an intensive, free course that will provide the basics of fly fishing. Whether you want to learn to fly fish or your friend, spouse, or neighbor would like to learn about fly fishing, this is your course! Taught by certified casters and knowledgeable fisherman, we guide the students though the complete fly-fishing process. We have instruction in fly casting, rigging the fly rod, needed knots, stream entomology and flies, stream fishing techniques, and lake fishing techniques. This will be SVTU's sixth course and it just gets better every year. Registration is required so watch the website.

2019—Future DNR Events

MD DNR Biological Stream Survey Training

Maryland DNR is offering training and certifications in Maryland Biological Stream Survey sampling protocols. The training will be held at Howard County Community College. Through a mix of classroom and field experiences, participants will learn and be tested on bentic macroinvertebrate and fish sampling methods, physical habitat assessment, fish taxonomy and how to be a crew leader. The Spring training session will be held 9 AM to 3:30 PM February 26th. Registration deadline was February 12th

Summer training will be held May 28-31, with registration deadline of May 1st.

A great addition to your Fly Box - Crickets

Though the season is a bit early for using this terrestrial fly, it is never too early to consider adding it to your fly box. This article was submitted by SVTU Chapter Board member, John Lachin. Enjoy.

The Cricket Fly

Back around 1980 there was an outdoors shop in the Midway Center Shopping Center next to the Shady Grove Transfer Station. One September day I remarked to the coowner, Rudy Mattern, that I had been skunked on a trip to

Big Hunting Creek. Rudy said that I should use a black cricket. His pattern was simple to tie, and I have since made some modifications, some according to my records, from a pattern by Jay Sheppard of PPTU. Every year I look forward to the opportunity to fish the fall cricket. I also tie a brown version that worked well in Little Seneca when it had fish. The brown pattern might also work well in Beaver Creek. Crickets will be active until the first killing frost that will occur sooner up in Thurmont or Beaver Creek than in Gaithersburg.



I tie the crickets on a 2x dry fly (Mustad 94831) or nymph hook (Mustad 9672), #12 or #14. You want the fly to ride low and the trout often respond to the "splat". It is important also to have an indicator so you can see where the fly is on the water. I tie a 2" single strand of white wool onto my leader about 3' above the fly and then trim it to about 1" and add floatant to the fly and indicator. Sometimes I use a dropper tied to the hook bend, like a Rainy's ant with a white tip that serves the same purpose.

Here are the recipes for the two flies:

Hook sizes: 12, 14, 2x

Black Cricket: Black thread, tie in dark dun feather by the stem, dull side facing to back. I tie the black cricket using some Newfoundland dog fur, very coarse, although any dark charcoal will do.

Add coarse dubbing up ¼" wide, thicker at hook bend, wrapped up to 1/8" from eye, make 2-3 wraps of feather close together and then palmer to front. Clip the hackles on the bottom between the 4 and 8 o'clock position (this can be done at the end as well). Add two dark brown or black quills, tent-style. Then add a thick clump of moose hair. If you tie a 16 then you can substitute some black elk for the

quill. Tie firmly so the moose hair flares. Then simply cut the moose hair tips with about a 1/8 - 3/16" head. If you want, you can spin a deer hair head, but it is not necessary.

Brown cricket: Same using brown hackle, coarse brown dubbing, like hare's ear, mottled brown quill, brown deer hair
