SVTU is planning on offering in-person fly-tying series the spring of 2024. We are going to have a social, in-person tying sessions held at the IWLA-R Chapter House. While there are plenty of online videos and resources that teach fly tying, nothing replaces a little hands-on instruction when you cannot make what looks "so easy" on the screen work for you.

We plan to make the tying sessions a social event as well, because we have not seen each other face-to-face many times in the past few years. It will be a good time to catch up on fishing and family, as well as do some fly tying.

We are planning on returning to a more structured course this year with flies, the techniques needed or taught, and material needs announced in advance. We have a limited number of tying vises and tool sets that will be available to those who need them. SVTU will furnish needed materials.

Fall Chapter Meetings and Events Recap

Following, is a brief description of some of the recent 2023 SVTU Chapter activities. It was a pleasure to resume "live" attendance meetings.

Emergency Tree Removal on Beaver Creek

The same storm that brought the August 7 fish kill on Beaver Creek also did damage to a tree along the creek. Normally, the removal of a tree in the creek would be left to nature or be a part of our normal fall Beaver Creek workday. However, due to the need for DNR to conduct a fish population assessment to determine the remaining trout population, the removal of the tree became an immediate priority.

On August 12, SVTU members Emiliano Morales, Doug Hutzell and Noel Gollehon, along with PPTU (Potomac-Patuxent TU) member Jason Simon tackled the task of removing enough of the tree to enable DNR to conduct an electro-shocking the following week. We left a part of the tree underwater for woody habitat. In about two hours on a hot, humid Saturday we had the tree trimmed back where access was possible to a fish population assessment.

Fly Fishing 101—Intro to Fly Fishing

Seneca Valley Trout Unlimited partnered with Izaak Walton League of Rockville to host a "Fly Fishing 101: Introduction to Fly Fishing". In the class, 21 students were exposed to all segments of fly fishing with an Introduction and Overview of fly fishing in the morning. That was followed by a BBQ sandwich lunch with all the sides and pumpkin pie for dessert.

Then the students broke into two groups to acquire hands-on experience with three critical elements of fly fishing

- How to cast a fly rod
- How to rig a fly rod
- How to tie the correct knot depending on the need

Finally, students moved over to Great Seneca Creek for a demonstration of stream fishing, casting, and line management in moving water with three different types of fly fishing techniques.

- Nymph fishing where the goal is to "dead drift" a fly under water
- Dry fly fishing where the floating fly imitates an insect on the water
- And, streamer fishing where the fly imitates a small bait fish

It was a great day at the lake. The students all learned a great deal. Lunch was excellent. And a good time was had by all!

November Beaver Creek Workday

What: Tree Tube Removal

On November 4, SVTU members were among a group that removed and picked up tree tubes on a tract owned by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) just upstream of the Albert Powell Fish Hatchery on Beaver Creek.

DNR acquired the property and is converting it into woodlands to protect and filter the water flowing into Beaver Creek. The trees that survived have grown and were splitting the protective tree tubes. Where the trees did not survive the tubes were on the ground. The crew picked up and pulled out a pickup load of old tree tubes but came nowhere close to finishing the task. The clean-up crew were members of Seneca Valley TU, Beaver Creek Watershed Association, Antietam-Conococheague Watershed Alliance, the Sierra Club and interested individuals. SVTU Stories Driving & Fishing Along the Way

Have you ever wanted to just take off in your truck and go fishing? Well Doug Hutzell and I did just that in September 2023. We logged 5,000 miles, were gone 24 days (on the road 12 days and fishing for 12 days), wet our flies in eight different rivers and streams, and caught fish in every one. We traveled and joined up with others for parts of the trip, but it was Doug and I that managed to not kill each other for the 24 days.

We started fishing in Arkansas on the White. We went to the White to target browns on hoppers, but that did not work out. The water release out of Bull Shoals reservoir did not provide enough flow for the browns to come up off the bottom of the pools where they hide in low water. We caught rainbows using nymphs in the 12-15 inch range but no browns on hoppers.

Then it was on to the San Juan in New Mexico for a week fishing with friends and family. The San Juan was running high, so wading and fishing was a bit tougher than normal. The higher flows had the fish hanging in places where they would not normally be in September. And you would think that with as many fish as there are in the San Juan they would be easy to find, but they were not. That said all caught fish and we had a great time.

After a day off, to recover in Albuquerque, Doug and I were back fishing in northern New Mexico. This time in the Jemez Mountains in the Valles Caldera National Preserve. This high valley (above 8,000 feet) is the caldera of a volcano that erupted about a million years ago. It has quite a history being part of a Spanish land grant then to a private ranch and then to the Federal Government in 2000.

We had to get fishing permits from the National Park Service and a back-country vehicle pass because access is controlled to limit the number of visitors past the visitor center. We fished San Antonio Creek for wild browns and Jaramillo Creek for wild, native Rio Grande cutthroat trout.

The streams were small (literally step across them in places) but the fishing was fun even if getting the fly in the water with the wind and grass was a challenge. (Fun fact—the movie The Magnificent Seven was filmed here.) You can catch bigger fish in many places, but the location cannot be topped!



San Antonio Creek was 3 to 5 feet wide, but the wind made it hard to get the fly where it needed to be.



This was a wide spot in Jaramillo Creek. In most places it was about 18 inces wide and deep. But if you could get a fly on the water you could catch a fish.

We crossed the Rio Grande and started fishing on the slopes of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. These mountains are at the southern end of the Rockies with peaks over 13,000 feet. We started on the Red River, flowing to the west, toward the Rio Grande and finished on the Cimarron, flowing east into the Canadian River and eventually the Gulf of Mexico. In between the western and eastern streams we fished some beautiful high country especially the Rio Castilla.

The Rio Castilla is a high mountain valley stream that is managed by a combination of the Forest Service and the Rio Castilla Cooperative Livestock Association, that manages the land for grazing and recreation. The land has a long colonial history going back to Spanish exploration and settlement in the 1690s. In 1860 it was part of a land grant approved by Congress and the Livestock Association purchased 80,000 acres in 1942. Stream restoration activities, including a fish barrier to bar invasives, have occurred on the upper Rio Castilla and Comanche Creek, a major tributary.

Trout Unlimited was involved in those restoration efforts. Now there are wild native trout that we were fishing for. They were not big, maybe 8 inches but they were beautiful cutthroats. And they were FAST! You did not set the hook on your dry fly, they either hooked themselves or you missed it, cast again, and try to get the one just above the one you missed. It was a real treat to catch native fish in a beautiful area.

While in this area we stayed in Red River, New Mexico. It is a booming ski town with breweries and restaurants and a lot of cabins for rent. If you are looking for a high-elevation get away (over 8,400 feet) this is a beautiful area. (One note, to help locate the area. On our way down the Cimarron, we fished in a State Park. The park is just upstream of the Philmont Scout Ranch.)

The fishing portion of the trip was done, the rods packed away and we were on the road again. We traveled across northern New Mexico, southeastern Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, southern Illinois, southern Indiana, eastern Kentucky, West Virginia and then home. WHAT A TRIP!

Winter Casting Practice—Tips and Resources

This is a quick summation of the <u>complete article that</u> <u>can be found on SVTUs website</u>. Take the time to read it **and practice your skills**—no need to get rusty while inside during the winter months!

So winter is here, the sky is spitting ice, and the fly rods are nestled in their tubes, hibernating until March or April when you break them out and start waving them around at fish. Plenty of flies to tie and videos and books to read. But winter is also a good time to catch up on some casting goals, work on specific improvements or "rough" spots, and just keep your cast from getting rusty.

Winter is a good time to reflect on the summer's fresh fishing experiences and casting skills you would like to work on, embed the good casting habits you learned in the summer by accumulating good repetitions (reps) by continuing to improve your concentration, feedback, and casting stroke adjustment.

Practicing indoors and/or on warmer days outside can be a refreshing antidote for cabin fever and a reasonable alternative to fixing leaky faucets and other questionable practices. Some thoughts ...

List 2-3 improvements you want to make based on the past spring and summer's fishing experiences. **Did** you?

- Slow down and/or smooth out your basic stroke?
- Try a new grip?
- Improve accuracy?
- Cast in different planes—vertical, sidearm, oval, other?
- Reduce the number of false casts needed?
- Expand the variety of presentation techniques?

- Break down your stroke into component movements, pick the ones most important for you to improve
- Set measurable objectives for each movement

We have a "special" meeting planned for January 22. We will get the latest information about the August 2023 fish-kill on Beaver Creek from Maryland Department of Natural Resources. What's done is done, but we can help formulate a plan to see that it does not happen again and assist in the recovery efforts. Come to this meeting to offer your input and find a way to help bring more brown trout to Beaver Creek. Our speaker will be via Zoom, but several of us will gather at our usual meeting location to view the presentation and provide feedback over a "cold one" (weather permitting). Feel free to zoom in or join us in-person. (I remind everyone that winter driving conditions can be tricky. Before traveling to an SVTU event, confirm on our website that the meeting has not shifted to virtual only or has been rescheduled or canceled.)

Maryland DNR News Trout Stocking—Pre Season & Season

Edited from the DNR website:

DNR has begun "preseason" stocking with the first of about 290,000 trout in Maryland waters statewide.

This stocking will help coldwater hatcheries reduce overcrowded fish densities caused by record drought conditions this year. The first preseason stockings will be allocated to impoundments, special management, and delayed harvest streams providing ice fishing and catch-and-release fishing opportunities through winter and into the spring.

Sustained drought has resulted in historically low water flow at the spring-fed Albert Powell Hatchery and Cushwa rearing facility in Washington County. To compensate for the lack of water, the hatchery closed two of 19 outdoor holding areas called raceways and monitored water conditions closely to ensure the survival of the maximum number of trout.

The state's hatcheries are raising more than 290,000 brown, golden rainbow, and rainbow trout, which will be stocked in more than 119 locations across 19 counties during the 2024 spring season. The annual stocking program will be completed in three rounds – preseason from now through February 2024, followed

by two rounds of spring stocking, March 4 to 29 and April 1 to 26.

Once stocking is complete, DNR will provide updates on its <u>website</u> and via <u>email bulletin</u> and <u>social media</u>. Anglers may also call 800-688-3467 for a recorded weekly update (usually updated on Fridays) when stocking is in process. Stocked locations that fall under a closure period are not included in the daily updates but will be announced before opening day on March 30, 2024.

The trout stocking program is supported by the sale of nontidal fishing licenses and trout stamps as well as funding through the federal Sport Fish Restoration Program.
