Program: **Designing Fly Patterns**

Lou Digena, a Life Member of Trout Unlimited, former NJTU President, TU's National Leadership Council, representing New Jersey, and served on NJTU's board for over 25 years. His formal fly-tying training started in 1988 at NJTU's Beginners fly-tying course.

Lou uses his fine arts background to produce patterns with a simple and studied elegance. Lou follows the KISS rule (Keep It Simple Stupid) when designing patterns. His primary target is trout throughout the United States. Lou's home waters are in the northeast, where he fishes for native Brook Trout, wild Browns, Bass, Panfish, and toothy critters. He enjoys tying traditional patterns like Frank Sawyer's Pheasant Tail and Killer Bug and creating new patterns, like his Lou's Stonefly Creeper, Tiger Baetis, Bubble Pupa, CE Crayfish (Close Enough), SP Baitfish (Simple Perch), and KISS Crane Fly Larva.

Lou is on the Solarez Pro, Ewing Feather Birds, Regal Vise Pro Staff, and Tenkara USA Ambassador. He also guides for South Branch Outfitters in Califon, formerly Shannon's Fly Shop.

Jeff Slevin has been an avid fisherman since a child, mainly fishing for warm water species. In 2013, when he and his family moved to England for two years, he started to focus on trout. Since returning and living in Pittsburgh, PA, he has considered central Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and western Maryland his "home" streams.

Since January 2023, he has been traveling the country with his wife in an Airstream travel trailer in his pursuit of catching a trout in all 50 states, along with visiting the high point of each state. During that time, Jeff has caught a trout in 39 states and 3 Canadian provinces while fishing 77 different streams and rivers. He has been successful on 75 of those 77 waters, i.e., only been skunked twice the first time he fished them, and his story is that there were extenuating circumstances in both instances.

MAC TIC expects we will touch over 4,000 students each year. I've been helping run the program that has exposed close to 50K students to trout and clean cold fishable water.

SVTU is excited to announce the 2026 fly-tying series this winter and spring! The series will be hosted at the Izaak Walton League of America Rockville (IWLR) Chapter House upper-level meeting room, from 7 pm to 9 pm, for the following dates: January 26, February 2 and 16, March 2, 16, and 30, and April 6 and 20. The sessions will offer a great opportunity for both new and experienced tiers to share skills, refresh fly boxes, and prepare for the upcoming fishing season.

The first session (January 26th), Introduction to Fly Tying, will kick off the series and is designed especially for beginners. Participants will learn the fundamentals of fly tying, including how to use essential tools such as the vise and bobbin, as well as techniques for thread and material control. The class will also cover tying a basic fly; The Green Weenie. This hands-on lesson is perfect for anyone who has wanted to create their own flies or better understand the craftsmanship behind them.

Each subsequent meeting will build upon the last, introducing new techniques, materials, and patterns tailored to local waters. Sessions will cover tying nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. Some of the flies to be tied are Elk Haired Caddis, Hare's Ear, Foam Grasshopper, and the Wooly Bugger, in addition to others.

All equipment and materials will be provided, free of charge. However, if participants have their own gear, they encouraged to bring it.

December Program

Taylor Hess, owner of Appalachian Fishing Guides in Lock Haven, PA, provided an engaging presentation to SVTU members about the wide variety of fly-fishing opportunities in Central Pennsylvania. He began by taking us through each of the four seasons and provided a broad overview of the opportunities and challenges of each.

November Event

In place of the November meeting, SVTU held a successful community building event with our first-ever combined gear sale and fly rod demo. The event scored a double win by both helping attendees get quality equipment at low prices, and giving them the chance to compare 12 different fly rods of all different weights, sizes, and actions.

The swap meet attracted almost fifty members and guests to shop for bargains and bring their own lightly-used equipment to sell on consignment. Several club members used the opportunity to clear out their burgeoning storage lockers, giving new folks a chance to benefit from high-quality rods, reels, and other equipment at very favorable prices.

The core of the merchandise offered at the swap meet came from a generous donation to SVTU by the widow of a local fly fisherman. SVTU members were glad that this fisherman's excellent life-long collection

of gear and lures could find good homes with younger fisherman who can continue to use them.

The fly-rod demo gave attendees the chance to test hands-on twelve different rod and reel combinations. The options included everything from a 2-weight, 6 foot rod best for brook trout in very close quarters, to a 9 foot 9 inch 9-weight rod which would work well for salt-water fly fishing or steelhead.

As he so often does at SVTU events, expert instructor Dave Cleaves was on hand to offer tips on casting form with the different rods. Club members particularly appreciated the chance to try out all these rods at once and compare them to each other. Since several local fly shops have closed in the past two years (with the latest loss being Beaver Creek's Fly Shop), it has become increasingly difficult to find places where one can test-drive equipment before purchasing it.

Because of the success of the gear swap, there is already talk of holding a similar event in the spring, combining an equipment sale and a casting class. Stay tuned for details!

We hosted 16 excited students and 11 SVTU volunteers that participated in a $\frac{3}{4}$ day course that covered the basics of fly fishing. The course started with a classroom session explaining the basic elements and terminology of the sport.

We then had a great BBQ lunch before moving to the hands-on sessions in the afternoon. We had students casting a fly rod, tying knots and viewing alternative rigging methods, examining flies and discussing stream entomology, and observing stream fishing techniques.

September Chapter Program

Maryland DNR Freshwater Fisheries Biologist Michael Kashiwagi will present an overview of trout population trends in the Catoctin Mountain region streams. He discussed fish and stream surveys that can be used to identify, re-designate, and protect coldwater resources.

Kevin Haney is the coordinator of the Big Hunting Creek Working Group, a group created to address issues regarding Big Hunting Creek and the surrounding Catoctin trout streams. Kevin provided an update on the group's activities, plans, and engagement. The group includes representatives from local fishing organizations, and state and Federal interested parties. The group is trying to present a united front on Big Hunting Creek and other Catoctin streams to improve habitat and the fishing opportunities.

Volunteers Needed

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) Needs Volunteers!

The trout in the classroom program needs volunteers for Montgomery County. On January 21, 2026, a group including volunteers from SVTU will deliver trout eggs to 12 Montgomery County schools. The eggs will hatch and grow to fingerling size in the school tanks, carefully monitored by students under teacher supervision. They will monitor water quality, temperature and Ph as they watch the trout grow through their different stages.

The program is carefully integrated into the science program at the schools. Volunteers are mostly needed at the trout releases starting in late April and continuing into late May when the schools will release their trout into Little Seneca Creek.

The release is also a learning day for the students who will test the water quality in the creek, look for macroinvertebrates, and have a fly rod casting session all in a few hours. It takes a lot of volunteers to repeat

that process for each of the 12 schools. If you have some time during the school day (generally from about 9:30 a.m. to 2:00) p.m., teaching 30-60 kids is really a lot of fun!

SVTU & Conservation Beaver Creek Workday

2026 SVTU Shad Extravaganza

Please consider joining your fellow SVTU members for the 3rd annual shad fishing outing on Conowingo Creek this spring (date to be determined, keep an eye on the website).

You might be thinking, why shad fishing?

- It's incredibly fun. When hooked, shad behave like puppies with zoomies—they pull hard and often jump repeatedly before being netted and released. (I don't advocate hooking and netting puppies, only shad).
- You can use the gear you already have—a 5 or 6 weight rod and line work just fine.
- You have the possibility of catching many dozens of fish in a single day (if you hit the run at the right time).
- The fish can get pretty big. Hickory Shad average 12"-20" and American Shad average 20"-24" and can reach 30".

- You have good chance to see many bald eagles and ospreys. If the fish are in, the birds will be there.
- All shad fishing in Maryland is catch-and-release and has been since 1980 to support the fishery.

Both Hickory and American shad are anadromous fish, which means they live most of their lives in the ocean, and return to freshwater rivers and streams to spawn in the spring. Adult shad return to the river or stream where they were born. There are two different shad runs in the spring. Hickory shad come in first, usually starting in March, and spawn between mid-April and May. American shad usually come in starting in April, and spawn between late-April and June.

The exact date of this outing will be determined later this spring depending on water temperature, flow level, and water clarity. Based on the shad runs of the past few years, the outing will likely take place in late-April to early-May. We will post information well in advance of the trip on the SVTU website and send out notifications via email and social media.

Bahamas on the Fly Two Trips to South Andros Island

I hadn't fished in the Bahamas since 2015. I took one of George Layton's Orvis sponsored trip out of the Tysons Corner Store. I had been anxious to get out of the area for warmth and a change of pace. Fishing South Andros seemed like a good change of scenery. I had previously fished North Andros but I had been told that this would be different and better. I had forgotten that my casting skills in windy conditions left something to be desired but the getting away was all the motivation that I needed.



A two hour flight into Nassau and a twenty minute shuttle hop on a twin engine plane operated by flamingo Air took me to South Andros Island. The island is dotted by small lodges and air B and B's and pock marked by the effects of storms.

I stayed at Swain's Cay Lodge. It is operated by a Bahaman woman, Cheryl Bastian. The lodge is clean, close to the water, air-conditioned, has excellent food, a friendly staff, and a comfortable bed. It was perfect.

Situated twenty yards from a narrow beach, there is an expansive flat that reaches out to open water. It is great for practicing the double haul or kayaking. A short walk up the beach will end at a point where mutton snapper can be caught and prepared by the lodge's chef. I very quickly realized that my double haul was going to make fishing a bit challenging, especially with nineteen to twenty-one mile per hour winds. That being said, I was now on Bahamas time. Sit back, enjoy the day, don't be in a hurry, and Be



Happy, Don't Worry.

Cheryl hand picks a number of local guides that have an array of different talents. There are some that can cast a hundred yards with either hand and the wind is not an issue. There are some that are good teachers and some that have excellent boats. It is a small island and every one of the guides know each other or are related.

My first trip left me with the desire to return. On the last day I had a conversation with Cheryl. I wanted to return before the end of the spring season and I wanted a specific guide. Randy had a set up that was designed for success all I needed to do was vastly improve my casting. She arranged for me to return the first week of June. I spent my windy days improving my casting and my nights tying #4 and #6 Gotchas. When I returned in June, the lodge was empty because a large party had cancelled.

This was a bonus. I had solitude, good meals, the sounds of the waves and the warm breezes. I was wondering if I was going to want to go home. My guide was a good teacher and very patient with any of my poor casts.



We fished the Middle Bight for three days. The main Island is a maze of little creeks and channels that are sandwiched by the mangroves. There is an outer barrier island that shelters the creeks and channels. I spent a good part of the day trying to sight fish, read the water, as well as casting to the elusive bone fish. With sharks in the water and lots of fishing pressure the fish are naturally skittish. The first cast has to be on target or it's a miss. I saw more large single cruising fish than I saw schools. There were plenty of sea turtles and birds nesting in the mangroves to be a pleasant distraction. Every time Randy would change flies he would rub a slurry of sand on them to clean off any oil or foreign scents that would be detected by wary fish.

I was beginning to see more fish, my casting had improved, my flies were fishing well, and I hadn't missed as many fish as on my previous trip. A good guide that was a teacher made all the difference. I hooked and landed some big fish. There was one that had bent one of my flies as he took off with my reel spinning out of control. Unfortunately, he wrapped my line around a mangrove and released himself. This was a memorable trip and I can't wait to go back.

Lessons Learned

Even though you think you can see the fish swallow the fly, don't set until the guide says "set". He can actually see the head move so he knows the fly is in its mouth. I had a guide in New Mexico tell me he knows to set when the gill plates move.

Before you start fishing let the guide know what your goals are, show him your cast and ask him how to improve it. This makes for a good day. Spending three days with the guide one on one I got to know him very well. And...**Remember to Strip Set!**

Maryland DNR News: Trout Stocking 2026 Pre Season & Season

The fall 2025 Put and Take trout stocking season wrapped up in late October. In total, crews stocked 15,700 brown, golden rainbow, and rainbow trout averaging one pound each into 29 waterbodies.

Though stocking was completed, the work is not over for hatchery crews. The cycle of production never ceases. Recently hatched brown and rainbow trout fry were transferred to indoor circular tanks to grow. Once large enough, they will be transferred to outdoor raceways where they will be cared for daily to meet the needs of the next season and beyond.

With improved water conditions during 2025, the production goal for the 2026 season is to increase by approximately 20%, helping us meet our trout management and stocking goals.

Anglers are encouraged to check the [MD DNR Fisheries website](#) for stocking updates as pre-season stocking gets underway early in 2026.

Once stocking is complete, DNR will provide updates on its website and via [email bulletin](#) and [social media](#). Anglers may also call 800-688-3467 for a recorded weekly update (usually updated on Fridays) when stocking is in process. Stocked locations that fall under a closure period are not included in the daily updates but will be announced before opening day on March 30, 2026.

The trout stocking program is supported by the sale of nontidal fishing licenses and trout stamps as well as funding through the federal Sport Fish Restoration Program.
